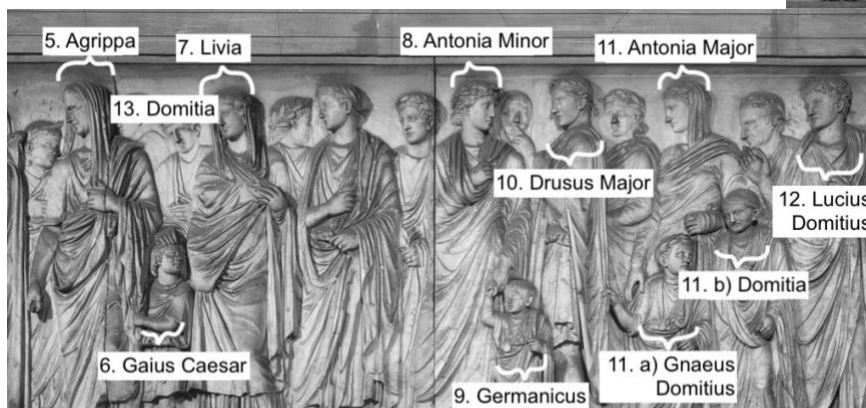

Agrippa and Magistrates in Southern Processional Frieze

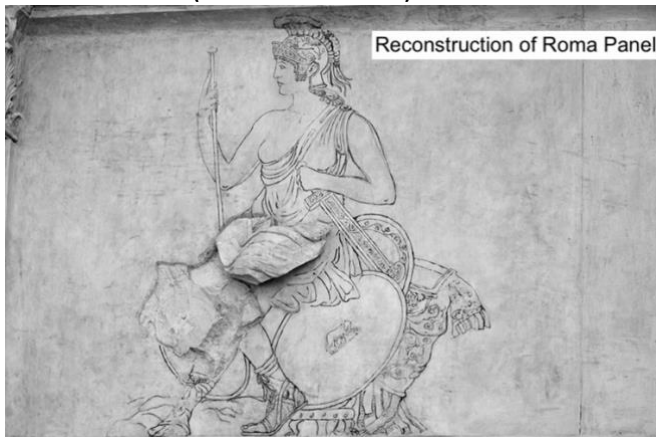


Identification of Imperial Family in Southern Processional Frieze

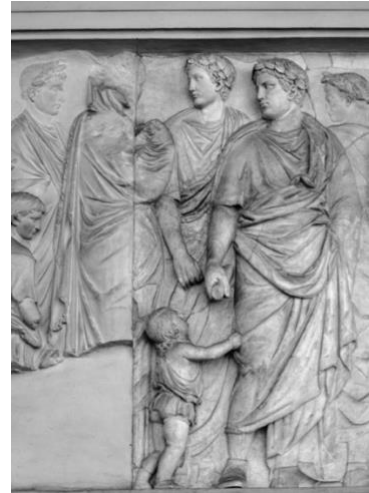
Key of Figures

1. First emperor of Rome
2. Rex Sacrorum, High Priest
3. Major Priests, served Jupiter, Mars, and Quirinus
4. Attendant/bodyguard to magistrates
5. Roman general and right-hand of Augustus, also his son-in-law
6. Son of Agrippa and Julia the Elder and heir to throne, Augustus' biological grandson and adopted son
7. Wife of Augustus and Roman Empress, Augustus' only biological child
8. Niece of Augustus, daughter of Mark Antony
9. Son of Antonia Minor and Nero Claudius Drusus
10. Husband to Antonia minor and member of Claudian patrician class
11. Niece of Augustus and elder sister to Antonia Minor
 - a. Mother to Gnaeus Domitius, would become the father of Emperor Nero
 - b. Domitia, daughter of Antonia Major and Lucius Domitius
12. Husband to Antonia Major

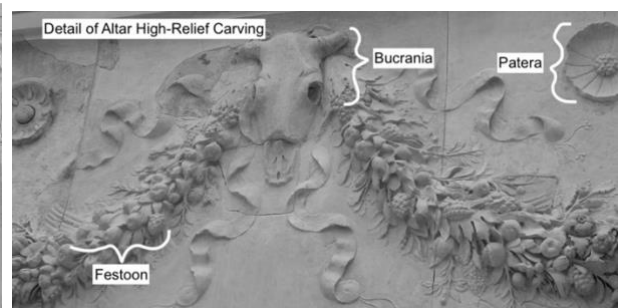

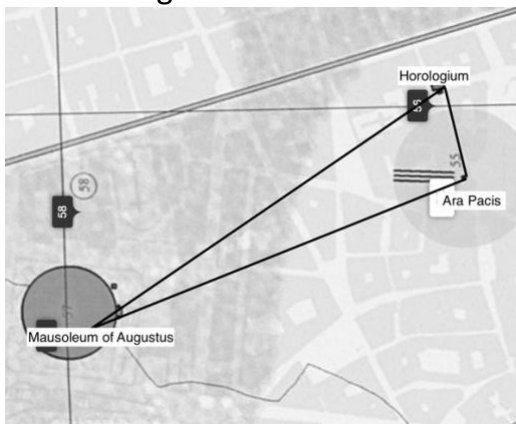

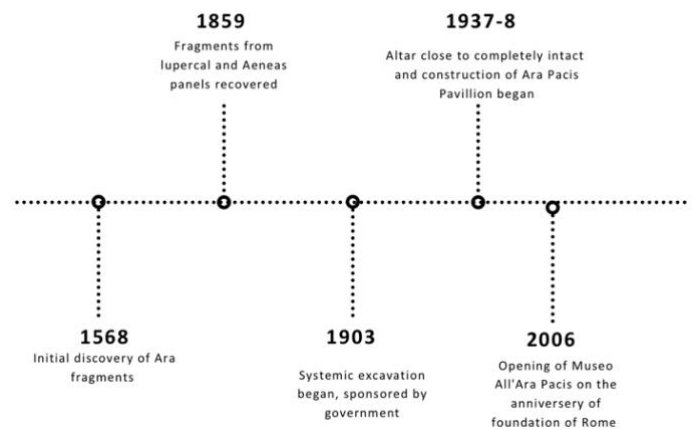

Glossary

- *Acanthus* – Common and recurring plant symbol in antique architecture
- *Bucrania* – The decorative head of a sacrificial ox
- *Fascis* – a bundle of rods with a projecting axe blade, carried by a lictor in ancient Rome as a symbol of a magistrate's power, and used as an emblem of authority in Fascist Italy
- *Festoon* – a chain or garland of flowers, leaves, or ribbons, hung in a curve as a decoration
- *Frieze* – a decorative horizontal band running along the top of a wall inside or outside a structure
- *Honos* – Roman god personifying honor
- *Lictor* – an officer attending the consul or other magistrate, bearing the fascis, and executing sentences on offenders
- *Magistrate* – Roman elected officials
- *Meander* – decorative border constructed from a continuous line, shaped into a repeated motif
- *Patera* – a broad, shallow dish used in ancient Rome for pouring libations
- *Princeps* – Latin word meaning first in time or order; the first, foremost, chief, the most eminent, distinguished, or noble; the first man, first person
- *Rex Sacrorum* – high priest (senatorial position)
- *Virtus* – Roman goddess personifying glory
- *Volute* – a spiral scroll characteristic of Ionic capitals and also used in Corinthian and composite capitals

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
